ONE MORE BOARD BRIEF

NOTES FROM THE TREASURER

At the conclusion of last month's "notes", I indicated we would talk about "Designated" (or if you prefer, "Reserve") funds this month. So, here goes. In order to hopefully avoid, as near as possible, huge expenses occurring for which no funds have been set aside, the Association established two Designated or reserve funds. Most homeowners are aware of the "Road Fund" which was put in place at the time we took over responsibility for all roads in Myrtle Trace. The Designated fund many may not be aware of, is one in which we look at certain assets, determine their anticipated life span (i.e. the number of years before they will have to be replaced or undergo major repairs), and set aside funds each year to cover the anticipated replacement cost. Examples would be heat pumps, air handlers, water heaters, repainting the Clubhouse and Cabana, etc. If a heat pump is new and has a life expectancy of 10 years, with a replacement cost, of say, \$3,000, then \$300 per year for 10 years would be set aside in the designated fund to pay for its eventual replacement.

Funds set aside are held in CD's at several different banks, depending on which banks pay a higher interest rate as a CD matures. Unfortunately, over the last few years, the interest rate on CD's has been very low, which has somewhat limited larger growth in the funds. However, the Association is not allowed to invest money in funds that would risk our investments, or lose principal. As of September 1, 2016, the Road Fund has \$257,739.88 invested and the Designated Fund has \$86,660.16 invested. By having these resources set aside, the Association would hope to avoid ever having to utilize a "Special Assessment" of some amount to homeowners. Please note the Operating Fund (the majority of our budget) pays for reoccurring, "everyday" expenses and is totally separate from Designated Funds.

ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW COMMITTEE

Recently we have had some questions regarding stone ground cover and the colors that may be used. Earth tone colors have always been acceptable and continue to be. We have also added river rock as an acceptable option. This comes in a variety of sizes and is a multicolored mixture (tan, gray and white). This gives homeowners a light option for landscaping. Pure white stone without this mixture of color is still prohibited. We hope this clears up the confusion concerning the use of this lighter color stone.

SMOKE DETECTORS

While getting dressed one morning, I heard my battery powered smoke detector start to sound off. While not detecting any smoke or fire I could only assume the battery was old and needed replacement. However, within two or three minutes, the second detector which was wired into the house electrical system started to beep as well. The fact that two separate alarms on two separate systems went off a few minutes apart really frightened me. I even investigated the storage area over the garage but found no problem.

The more I thought about it, the more worried about it I became so I decided to check with the Fire Station behind Horry-Georgetown Tech. I spent about 30 to 40 minutes with a couple of firemen. One was the Squad Leader and I was told to expect a visit in a couple of hours. In a short while, a huge fire truck pulled up in front of the house. My first reaction was "Oh great, now I'll have to explain to all the neighbors!" The firemen first checked out the older alarm and found it to be obsolete and tossed it out replacing it with a new one including a battery. Then, looking at the wired-in alarm, they determined the back-up battery needed replacement and installed a new one with a ten year life. I never realized it had a battery but was told it was necessary in case of an electrical outage. They, then made recommendations for an additional alarm or two. All of this at no charge to me. With so many new residents over the last few years, I thought it would be helpful to alert them to the programs available to us at little or no cost.

9 VOLT BATTERIES

Unlike AA batteries and AAA batteries, 9 volt batteries have terminals adjacent to each other. When they are discarded it is possible for the terminals to come in contact with an electrical conductor such aluminum foil. When this happens, the battery can overheat and burst into flames. The message here - be very careful when discarding 9 volt batteries.

DISEASED or DESTRUCTIVE TREES: First and foremost you need to submit a "Request For Removal" form to the ARC Committee. Once the tree is removed, it would seem prudent to replace it with a healthy and more desirable specimen —

November is the ideal time to place new trees and shrubs in your landscape. Replacing or placing a tree will contribute to maintenance of the forested integrity of the Myrtle Trace community. You will need to consider site and growth factors to determine the ideal tree for your landscape. Site factors include soil conditions, hardiness, moisture, light, and of course space. Tree factors include form; use and function; aesthetics; growth rate and, most importantly, maintenance and health issues. The best trees are the ones that are the hardiest for zone 8 as well as being highly disease and insect resistant. Trees to consider are native oaks, magnolias, hollies, dogwood, and fringe trees to name but a few. Clemson University has two excellent publications to assist in the selection process – *South Carolina Urban Tree Species Guide: Choosing the Right Tree for the Right Place* and *Trees of Strength*. Both publications may be found online and can be downloaded as PDFs.

Remember a healthy well placed tree will provide a multitude of benefits for generations.

OUR UNDERGROUND PIPELINES AND SINKING FEELINGS

As mentioned in the *News & Views* (Sept. 2016), one of the primary purposes of our fifteen “lakes” is to collect and hold storm water run-off. The question is; what happens when we get a heavy rain? The answer; when the lakes were dug at least one outflow pipe was installed in each lake. These pipes serve as a conduit, moving the excess water to the county storm ditch, which runs parallel to Route 501 from Conway to Myrtle Beach and also to ponds on the Burning Ridge Golf course. These underground pipes are present under six roads within the Myrtle Trace community, several places in fact under Myrtle Trace Drive. In addition the developer installed several long runs of drainage pipes on private property in three different locations in Myrtle Trace. Like the outflow pipes, the drainage pipes serve as conduits, moving water from swales to larger pipes and ultimately the county ditch. The outflow and drainage pipe are important and play a vital role in the Myrtle Trace infrastructure.

You are probably wondering what the underground pipelines have to do with sinking feelings.

2010 – Sinkhole, caused by a rusted outflow pipe.

2012 – Loss of lake water Phase VII, caused by leak in pipe.

2014 – Leak in collection box Phase VIII, caused by a leaky pipe.

2015 – Sinkhole, Phase III, caused by a rusted pipe.

2015 – Flooded property Phase V, cause, a clogged drainage pipe.

2016 – Sinkhole, Phase I, caused by a separated pipe.

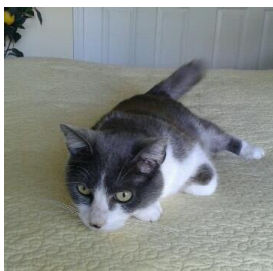
2016 - Sinkhole, Phase III, cause either broken or leaking pipe.

The sinkhole in Phase III is located at end of Heron Lake adjacent to the county ditch. It is a large outflow pipe which carries excess water directly into the county ditch. The location is difficult for excavation due to its proximity to a well and a pump used to supply water to lakes Heron and Bunting. Further examination of this outflow pipe is required to determine if the problem is holes in the pipe or a break and if the pipe can be repaired or will need to be replaced.

The incidents described above have several things in common: all involve a part of an aging infrastructure and, due to underground location of the pipes, the potential problem could not be readily foreseen. However, the most important commonality is the fact that no money has been budgeted to cover repair costs for each of these needed repairs. The cost to repair or replace these items has ranged from several hundred dollars to over \$12,000.00. The potential cost of repair or replacement for the most recent sinkhole may well exceed \$12,000.00.

The Myrtle Trace Homeowners Association has what are known as Reserve Funds. These funds are used when the Association is faced with unanticipated repair costs. However, the increased need and frequency of use of these funds impacts the Association’s fiscal well-being. Therefore, a close examination and careful financial planning are necessary to insure the Reserve Funds are not diminished, or eventually depleted.

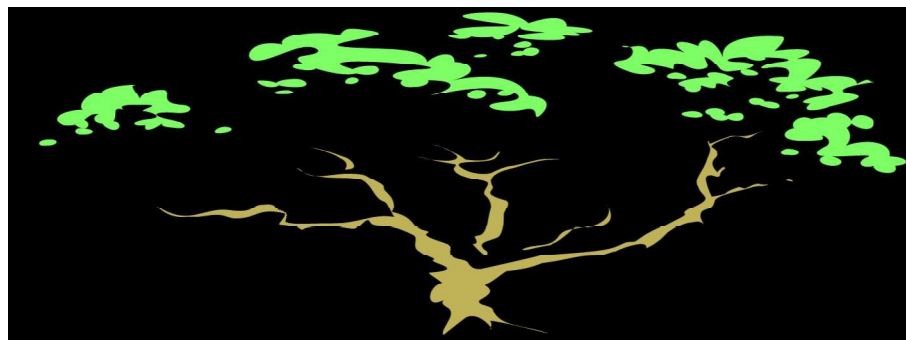

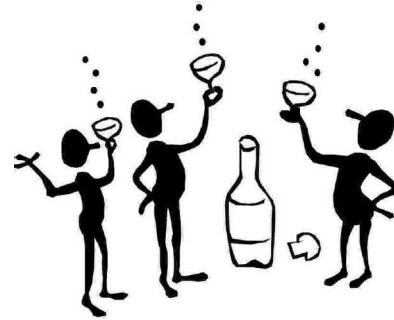

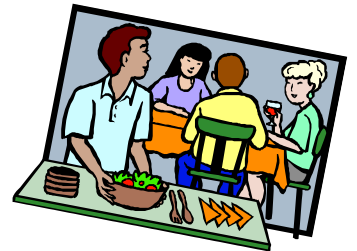
