PROPERTY COMMITTEE

SOD REPLACEMENT: For HOA front lawns that are not growing or are bare, the sod replacement forms are in three places: Your MTHOA Guidelines book, our website or in the wall hanger in the Clubhouse by the phone. Fill it out and drop in the HOA slot. You will be apprised if you will be getting sod and the date it will be installed. Please keep your new lawn soaking wet for at least three weeks for the roots to take.

Forms are due by April 30, 2023 and can be dropped in the MTHOA slot to the left of the Clubhouse door.

BLOWING OF CUT GRASS INTO OUR STREETS: Many people have noticed that individual lawn companies doing yard work for our residents are cleaning up by blowing debris into our roads. This is not allowed and is a danger to those who are walking. Please ask your yard company to pick up your debris and grass cuttings, etc., and dispose of them at a recycling center. Thank you.

<u>CLUBHOUSE</u>: We have a new front door lock. The entry combination remains the same. If you are the last person leaving the Clubhouse, close the front door and look at the key pad. You will see a button with a lock icon on it. Please press. You will hear a slight gear noise as the door locks.

MAINTENANCE AGREEMENT: March 31, 2023, is the last day you can apply for a Maintenance agreement.

PAINTING: The Clubhouse, cabana and maintenance crew shed will be getting a fresh coat of paint in the coming weeks.

40th Anniversary 1983 to 2023

As we celebrate Myrtle Trace's 40th birthday, it seems fitting to interview some of the residents who were here from the beginning. We hope you enjoy reading the first of many interviews. The first interview is with Tom Allen who was instrumental in the development of Myrtle Trace.

<u>Tom Allen – 111 Berry Tree Lane</u>

In early May of 1983, Tom & Dorothy Allen departed their home in Niagara Falls, New York, for a two-week trip to South Carolina. Tom was a practicing architect and Dorothy was an "early" retired school teacher. The purpose of their trip was to find an investment property that would qualify as a tax shelter. Once here, they visited a dozen communities under development. One of those developments was Myrtle Trace.

Their only lead to Myrtle Trace was a brochure picked up from a display rack in a restaurant. To their surprise, when they drove into Burning Ridge they discovered that there was nothing there but a sign directing them to a trailer in the Burning Ridge Golf Club parking lot. Inside this single-wide trailer sat two people: Glen Hall, the developer, and Ron Shumaker, his only salesman. With nothing more to look at than a sales packet, their meeting was, nevertheless, informative and very cordial. Myrtle Trace had just started the previous month, April 1983.

Tom and Dorothy first purchased a townhome at 111 Cricket Court. By November of 1983, the townhouses had been completed. Closing was set for November 18th. It was not only a big moment for Tom & Dorothy, it was also a big moment for Glen Hall. It was to be his first closing in Myrtle Trace. Tom and Dorothy loved the location and before departing they considered building another, but this time a bigger house that they could eventually retire to.

They entered into a purchase contract to build a patio home at 111 Berry Tree Lane. Tom was allowed to draw his own plans. Originally intended to be a rental until Tom retired, they ultimately decided to pull up stakes in Niagara Falls and relocate to Conway when the house was finished and "start over". That happened in April of 1985.

Tom and Dorothy's original plan had been an early semi-retirement but this turned into a full-time job as a residential architect when Glen Hall approached Tom about providing his design and drafting services. Tom converted one of his guest bedrooms to a drafting room and began work. He was 49 years old.

By this time, Myrtle Trace had picked up momentum and was finishing Phase I and commencing work in Phase II. Tom went on to design most of the homes in Phases III, IV, V, VI, & Phase VII.

Both Tom and Dorothy say Myrtle Trace has aged well. Tom says the HOA and its grounds crew and committees have always been on top of things and residents continue to take pride in the appearance of their homes. Myrtle Trace still embodies what Tom refers to as a "tranquil rustic charm" that was envisioned 40 years ago.

ACTIVITY WITHIN MYRTLE TRACE

Over the next few weeks the buildings on Pear Tree Circle (the Clubhouse, Cabana, and Maintenance Building) will be repaired and painted. The work will be done before the pool opens on May 1.

Contracts have been signed for the continuing repair and maintenance of our roads. As soon as schedules are available, we will inform residents who may be impacted by the road work. And we have approved studies in preparation for our major road project for 2024.

The Board has approved the Property Committee's request to remove a number of dead trees on common property and we are studying the report of the TREE PLANNING COMMITTEE and will continue to work with them to replace many of those trees on common property which we have lost to disease.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

Neighborhood Watch is anxious to do more to protect our community and residents. Should you be aware of an intrusion or suspicious activity in and around your neighborhood, call the non-emergency police number (843-248-1520) to report it. Also, call Ann Golden (617-838-5930), the Chair of Neighborhood Watch, who keeps a log of incidences such as suspicious activity or intrusions, and uses that information to request a greater police presence and more patrols in our area. She will also make her neighborhood watch patrols aware of these events and sightings.

2023 ANNUAL MEETING

Our annual meeting at HGTC was very well attended. There were approximately 178 people in attendance and we were happy to see a good mix of newer and long-term residents. There were 128 in person votes and 140 proxies counted by our volunteer election committee. We tried a slightly new format this year including the written committee reports in the annual packet that shortened the meeting and seemed to be well received. We thank our Election Volunteers for another successful meeting and have already made the reservation for the auditorium for next year's meeting on February 3, 2024 at Horry-Georgetown Technical College.

MYRTLE TRACE WILDLIFE

Now that we've changed our clocks and await the arrival of warmer weather we're going to see more and more visitors to our community in the form of wildlife and feral cats. Many of our residents welcome these visitors and enjoy watching them, while others consider them a nuisance. However, all of us should be aware of the laws in place regarding wildlife. For instance, there is a federal law which states that we may not harm geese, their eggs or their nests, and there is an Horry County ordinance which states that "no person shall feed, cause to be fed or provide food for domestic or migratory water fowl in residential areas of Horry County". We have a Myrtle Trace guideline stating that a complaint may be lodged against the feeding of feral cats. For further information, come to a meeting on April 27 at 10am in the Clubhouse when a representative from the Department of Natural Resources will be discussing wildlife in our area. All are welcome!

With regard to feral cats, there are a number of resources available, all of which are based on the practice of Trap, Neuter, and Return. The following organizations can provide more information on feral cats:
