### **BOARD BRIEFS**

#### TRESPASSING AND PRIVATE PROPERTY

At our last meeting the major topic of discussion was safety. As a result, you will see a number of suggestions and comments throughout this edition of News & Views relating to our safety as a community and your safety and security as a homeowner. While trespassing, break-ins and attempted break-ins are not new to Myrtle Trace, they are a problem for all of us and are something we should be aware of and guard against. Much like a hurricane, it's not a disaster unless you get a direct hit. Unlike hurricanes, though, there are some things we can do to prevent being a target.

The Property Committee suggested and the Board approved new signage throughout the community. Our current "no trespassing" and "no soliciting" signs, while attractive, are not doing the job and are easily removed. We will be installing new permanent signs indicating that this is private property and that there is no trespassing, no fishing, no soliciting, etc. We will be working with Tom Gray and the Property Committee to determine the content and placement of the signs.

We've been informed by police that "no trespassing" signs must be visible in order for the police to enforce the restriction. But the sign is only half of the solution - we must be willing to do our part. When we see trespassers on our private property, and that includes illegal solicitors, non-resident fishermen or prowlers or suspicious activity, we have to be willing to notify the police by calling the non-emergency police # (843-248-1520) and also inform our Neighborhood Watch Committee. Reporting the frequency of these incident calls to the police can result in extra police patrols in our area.

#### **EMERGENCY CONTACT LIST**

As a service to our members and our community, the Association keeps a confidential list of emergency contacts and phone numbers. You can designate a number of family members or friends who we can contact should you have a medical emergency or if something happens to your property while you're away and we want to get in touch with you. Often we have had irrigation systems go "rogue" while the homeowner is travelling and before we can respond we need information from you or someone you designate as a contact. Forms are available near the phone in the Clubhouse and Susan Granger is the contact Board member if you have questions.

#### SAFETY TIPS FOR MYRTLE TRACE RESIDENTS

Here we are, living the retirement life in Myrtle Trace. Life is grand when you are retired with not a care in the world. But that can be far from the truth and reality of today's times. We live in an area that is developing quickly. New construction is everywhere and people are moving in by droves. It is no longer the quiet haven it was 40 years ago. With all the growth and an expanding population, crime is sure to follow. And when that starts to happen, we need to become even more diligent with our safety. Here are important safety tips to protect your home and yourself:

- At night, leave lights on outside. Use motion lights or dusk to dawn lights for security. Put up cameras. Please be considerate of your neighbors, however, when mounting lights, particularly avoiding shining lights in the direction of your neighbor's windows.
- If you see something suspicious, contact the Horry County Police non-emergency number at 843-248-1520. Once you have spoken with officers, contact our Neighborhood Watch Chairperson.
- Let your neighbors know when you will be away for any amount of time. If they see someone in your home they can make the appropriate phone calls. If you have someone checking your home while you are away, let your neighbors know this, as well.
- Piled up newspapers, mail and packages are a tell-tale sign nobody is home. Have a neighbor take in these items daily while you are away.
- Keep your doors locked, especially the door leading from the garage to your home. Lock you car. Your garage opener is a key to your home. Consider removing it from the car while your car is parked outside.
- Make arrangements with your lawn care service to maintain your yard while you are away or in the event you are unable to return to your home in a timely manner following a severe storm.

The bottom line is, we are all responsible for our own safety. We need to use common sense, be aware, be smart, be diligent, and most importantly, stay safe.

#### DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES NEAR MYRTLE TRACE

Three buildings are nearing completion along Myrtle Ridge Drive. These will be commercial buildings as part of Myrtle Ridge Business Park. The tract adjacent to Vines Plumbing may be developed by Vines. That business is expanding and requires a central warehouse for its service technicians. While any development along Myrtle Ridge Drive increases traffic, a business park's hours may limit traffic to operating hours.

Horry County Council has deferred rezoning requests for the rezoning of the Chatham Crossing and Waters Tract development. These tracts are located beside Postal Way between Gardner Lacy Road and Carolina Forest Boulevard. The proposals request approval for mixed retail development anchored by as many as 1,154 homes. It also includes an additional red light located near Dunkin Donuts on Rt. 501. The proposal is opposed by many Carolina Forest residents and has been deferred at both council meetings in May. Attendance at council meetings will continue as development encroaches on our borders.

#### John and Judy Beam ~ 101 Juneberry Lane

For several years, John came to Myrtle Beach from Pennsylvania with friends to play golf. At that time all there was to do was play golf and go to the beach. One year the wives joined the golfers and by then the Waccamaw Pottery had opened. The pottery ushered in high-rises and malls and soon there was more to do. Judy suggested looking for real estate.
