

# **BOARD BRIEFS**

The first order of business at our June 21<sup>st</sup> meeting was a pleasant one. We happily accepted a donation of lounge chairs for our pool given by Jan and Steve Notte. The eight lounge chairs and matching tables were donated in memory of Jan's parents, Art and Chris Terhune, who were long-time residents of Boxwood Lane. We thank them for their thoughtful gift to the Myrtle Trace pool.

#### **FURTHER BOARD ACTIONS:**

#### SIGNS

The Board approved the Property Committee proposal to install 14 signs throughout Myrtle Trace, marking our area as "Private Property" with "No Trespassing", "No Soliciting" and where appropriate "No Fishing" and No Dumping". The signs will be standardized red and white metal signs 12x18 and 12x24, securely attached to metal posts and coated to protect against spray painting. They will be placed at both entrances as well as Loblolly, Candlewood and other areas throughout the community. The Board approved signs will eliminate the need for individual homeowners to post signs and will fulfill the legal requirements for enforcement. Our thanks to Tom Gray and Tina Hurley for spearheading this project.

#### **BUNTING ELECTRICAL BOX**

The Board approved money for a new weatherproof electrical box at the front entrance near the end of lake Bunting. The box controls the irrigation system at the front entrance and is in need of replacement now that the irrigation system has been repaired. Like many of us, it was feeling its age.

#### **INCONVENIENT PEAR TREES**

In keeping with Murphy's Law, another pear tree decided to drop a large limb at a most inconvenient time. The first incidence was near Boxwood Lane on a Sunday morning – the second was near the intersection of Myrtle Trace Drive and Cedar Ridge Lane at 9:30 pm. In both cases large limbs blocked the road. Thanks to a number of our residents and their portable saws who helped clear the limbs from the road which were hauled off by Hardee Maintenance the next day. We know our pear trees tend to drop limbs as they reach the end of their normal life span of 25 years. Rather than remove all the pear trees at once, we decided to deal with them as necessary and approved the removal of the rotted trees and stumps. We are working on a plan to replace them with something more appropriate.

- \* We're working on making the sound system more reliable and user friendly please don't change the settings we have technicians for that.
- \* The Clubhouse and the activities we enjoy there are open to all residents. If you want to use the Clubhouse for a private party, contact Pat Paxson to make the arrangements. You'll be asked to complete a request form and make a returnable deposit.

# More interviews with long-time residents who were here from the beginning.

## Horst Marzahl - 1200 Loblolly Lane

Horst and his late wife, Maureen, moved to Myrtle Trace in 1997 from the Albany, New York area. Their original plan had been to move to Naples, Florida, but Maureen thought it was too far from family. They began to drive along the coast as they wanted to be near the beach. They eventually saw a billboard with Walter Cronkite's picture advertising the Myrtle Trace Retirement Community. They contacted a salesperson and were pleased to learn that the floorplans could be customized. The lot they chose had been sold previously but the original buyers reneged and the Marzahl's felt fortunate to get it as the lot offered the privacy they desired. They saw how well things were being constructed in Phase VIII and Horst was very impressed.

He retired in 1995 after working as an ironworker for 30+ years. His wife had been a homemaker, seamstress and bookkeeper. Horst and Maureen enjoyed activities at the Clubhouse and Maureen attended coffees and a knitting group. Horst said retirement is the best time of life "as long as you have your health". He enjoyed, and still does, gardening, painting with oils on canvas, wood carving, making things out of leaded glass and making duck decoys. His paintings are wonderful, and I, as the interviewer, can attest to the quality and beauty of all of it. He is one of Myrtle Trace's hidden gems!

#### Tom and Judy Dovey – 248 Cottonwood Lane

Tom and Judy moved to Myrtle Trace from Baltimore, Maryland, within two days of retiring. Before that, they would come to Myrtle Beach to play golf and in 1987 they began looking at housing developments. One of the courses they played was Burning Ridge so it was natural to check out Myrtle Trace. They had also looked in North Carolina and Florida. There were only three houses on Cottonwood Lane when they first looked. They put a down payment on a lot on the golf course in November of 1993 and come down on weekends. They moved into their home in June of 1994. They liked the ambience of Myrtle Trace; the trees, the neutral colors of the homes and the overall prettiness of the neighborhood.

Tom and Judy each joined golf leagues in the community and were active in the Newcomer's group. At that time, the group had to find restaurants willing to cater to 100 people as all the new "Tracers" were a part of the group. They were able to meet so many people this way. Judy said Tom Allen made suggestions on ways they could change the layout of their home which they were very happy with. Over the years, Tom has had a lot of hobbies including painting, woodworking and stained glass. His latest hobby involves a 3D printer. They have been very happy with their years spent in Myrtle Trace.


