BOARD BRIEFS

BOARD ACTION TAKEN:

The Board and its committees regularly review our guidelines to ensure that they continue to serve the community and fulfill the intent and specifics of the Covenants. At our last meeting, the Board approved a change to the policy regarding planting on the Common ground around the mailboxes. We added "reflectors" to the policy so it now states that the reflectors on the mailbox posts must be visible. We will be raising the reflectors to the crossbar on the posts to accommodate those who wish to plant at the base of the post. As a reminder, the mailbox posts are standard, installed and maintained by Hardee Maintenance and are due to be painted in 2024.

BOARD ACTION TO BE TAKEN:

The Architectural Review Committee has made the following recommended changes to ARC guidelines:

- 1. Move to Paragraph 3 of Painting and Staining—Pg 4. Any exterior pipe, dryer vent, irrigation control panel, etc., must match the color of the house. Any items attached to the house must match the color of the house.
- 2. Windows—Phases I-VII—Pg. 5. Vinyl windows may be used for replacement. The color must be coordinated with the house and a sample of the window color must be approved by ARC prior to installation. Bronze color window frames continue to be an approved alternative to wood or vinyl frames. Clear plexiglass panels may be secured to existing window frames facing the golf course to prevent damage by golf balls.
- 3. Roofing—Pg. 5
- a. Phase 1-VIII Pre-approved shingles: ELK/GAF Architectural- 25 yr. charcoal, Owns-Corning Architectural- 30 yr. Charcoal black, Landmark Certainteed- Architectural 30 yr. Charcoal, IKO 40 yr. Architectural- Dual Black, Decra Metal Shingles- Charcoal, stone coated.

Townhomes in Phase 2 shall have Hickory, GAF Timberline Shingles only.

Note: Other manufacturers may offer shingles of similar design and color. The homeowner must submit an appropriate sample for ARC review before approval.

Plumbing or other vents protruding above the roof shall be painted black.

Fully screened patio rooms may have fully screened roofs (bird cage).

Newly constructed sunrooms and additions must be pitched, where possible, to allow for matching shingles. All flat roofs must be submitted for approval.

New roofing for existing sun and screen rooms must be submitted for approval.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE

ROADS: Residents, we need your eyes to let us know if you see any sinkholes in our roads or any roots coming out of the ground. If you do, please report them to your Phase rep.

POOL: Our latest attendance was 1,500 people.

PONDS: Our ponds are "retention ponds" (basins), artificial structures used for water runoff during heavy rains and/or storms. During the summer, rains are welcomed as temperatures rise & water levels are low. Concurrently, that's when our ponds develop large amounts of algae. Excess growth of algae may indicate there are pollutants that have washed into the ponds, including other pathogens living in the algae. For this reason, residents should avoid trying to remove debris from the ponds. A few ways we all can help:

- * Do not discard grass clippings or yard waste in the ponds.
- * Do not feed fish, turtles or waterfowl.
- * Pick-up pet waste.
- * Try to avoid fertilizing.

A VERY SHORT COURSE ON THE MYRTLE TRACE PONDS

There are 15 ponds is Myrtle Trace. They vary in size and shape but have a common purpose – to carry storm water runoff away from our properties. Most of our 15 ponds are connected through a system of underground pipes and transfer pumps. Some are shared with the Burning Ridge Golf Course (Grebe, Wren and a small part of Oriole), but all are subject to science, County and State laws, and the whims of Mother Nature.

Our ponds are regularly treated for algae and plant growth. It takes about 30 days for chemicals to do their job and kill plants and algae blooms which sink to the bottom and become nutrients for bottom feeders like carp and turtles. Fish are an important part of pond management so we stock the ponds and practice catch and release. We contract with a local company, Total Lake Care, for service and advice. Each regular visit generates a report to the Property Committee listing the details of their water treatment, their findings and their professional recommendations. Every three years they conduct a bathometry study measuring the depth of the water relative to the level of silt. The next study is due in 2024. Our professional contractor also recommends special projects such as aerators to oxygenate the water and dredging to keep the outflow pipes clear so they can do the job of carrying off excessive rains and runoff to the County ditch.

We have three deep wells which we use in times of drought to pump water into the ponds using a system of transfer pumps. The wells are permitted and controlled by the State and our water use is limited and must be reported to the State annually. Pumping water into the ponds controls the growth of weeds which not only detract from the appearance of the ponds but impede their proper function and health.

(Recommended changes to ARC Guidelines—continued)

- 1. Raised Decks—Pg. 6. Raised decks may be constructed of wood or composite deck material. Wood decks may be left to weather naturally or painted to match the color of the house. Railing and adjuncts must either be left to weather, painted to match the deck or be black aluminum or wrought iron. Composite deck material should be of the same or better quality than Trex which has been reviewed by ARC. This material shall be of a color that is compatible with the house. The homeowner shall produce warranty and quality information to ARC prior to construction.
- 2. Dog Runs—Pg. 6. Dog Runs are permitted providing they are not visible from the street, and providing that the space is kept to a minimum considering the number and size of the dogs. Fencing shall be of standard Myrtle Trace design painted to match the house or wrought iron or aluminum (black). An ARC representative will do an on-site placement and size determination.
- 3. House numbers—Pg.6. House numbers attached to houses shall be of standard Myrtle Trace design.
- 4. Exterior lighting—Pg. 8. White lighting fixtures and globes are not allowed in Phases I-VII. Security and landscape lighting shall be located, angled and be of a limited wattage so it is not obtrusive to neighbors. Addition of external lighting requires ARC approval.
- 5. Add Middle Ridge Ave. to Community Perimeter Boundary Fencing—Pg. 10.
- a) Only the properties backing up to future developments and/or roads of the community, i.e. Burning Ridge Road. Highway 501, West Ridge, Myrtle Ridge Road and Middle Ridge Ave. will be considered on an individual basis and must have ARC approval.
- 6. Illegal Tree Removal—Pg. 12. Remove \$250. Increase the fine amount to \$500 for each tree removed. Also, replacement of the tree is required and a \$150 planting fee is imposed if planted by the Association.
- 7. Prohibited Items: Large External Antennas.

Having published these proposed changes in this issue of News and Views, the Board will entertain comments and vote at the September 20 meeting.

While this may sound like a plan, along comes Mother Nature and hot weather which causes occasional algae blooms, growth of weeds and collections of natural debris carried by current and wind. While we do our best to "keep up appearances", our main concern must always be making sure the ponds are able to do the job they were designed to do. We have weathered a number of hurricanes in Myrtle Trace, one of which, hurricane Floyd, dropped over 20 inches of rain in our area in a short period of time. Hurricane Floyd was considered a hundred-year storm, and while surrounding areas experienced extensive flooding, Myrtle Trace experienced very little damage. So this time of year we keep the water levels lower so if we do experience unusual rainfall the ponds will be able to collect it and send it on its way without flood damage to surrounding properties. But, of course, lower water levels can set the stage for the growth of vegetation.

Managing the ponds is a balancing act and we are fortunate to have Tom Gray and the Property Committee working with our professional contractor to keep our ponds alive and well. While we never know what Mother Nature may throw our way, we have good management, planning and history on our side.



40th Anniversary Resident Interviews-1983-2023

Bruce Williams - 239 Candlewood Drive

Bruce is a native South Carolinian. He received a working scholarship to Coker College where he met his future wife, Mary Francis. After they married, he was called by the Navy and sent to Florida. Bruce retired from the Navy as a Lieutenant Commander (LCDR) in 2005 after serving four years active duty and 23 years in the reserves.

In planning for retirement, they had looked up and down the Eastern seacoast and decided Florida was too far from family. They had friends that lived in Myrtle Trace and included it in their search. They liked the closeness to the beach for walks and it felt like a secure, crime-free area. Everyone in Myrtle Trace seemed very friendly and they liked the ambiance of the community. They moved here from Pennsylvania in August of 2002. Their house was the first of the last five to be built in Myrtle Trace.

A month or so after moving in, they both joined the Myrtle Trace Bowling League. Bruce joined the Property Committee and was a member for approximately four years. He was responsible for trees and lakes, which at that time were under the covenants of the Property Committee and not the ARC Committee. Mary Francis wanted to join the Activities Committee so Bruce joined as well and they enjoyed that for about eight to ten years. Bruce said the Activities Committee is a great committee to be involved in. Bruce and Mary Francis started a Dine Around Group and met a lot of people. Bruce's involvement with the Myrtle Trace website began sometime before 2009 and continues today. He is currently the Assistant Webmaster and resident photographer for the site. He has always been interested in computers and photography.

Lyle Kershner – 108 Berry Tree Lane

Lyle and Sally moved here from Pennsylvania in May of 1984 and have lived in Myrtle Trace the longest! Lyle was retired from the U.S. Navy. He secured a job at a fabricated steel company in Myrtle Beach. They looked up and down the beach for a new home and on the last day their agent brought them to Myrtle Trace which was just beginning to be developed. At that time, there were about a dozen houses completed and only three houses occupied. The outside of the townhouses were finished but not the interiors. Lyle and Sally were the fifth family to move into Myrtle Trace. The golf course (Burning Ridge East) hadn't been built yet so it was all forest behind their house. Therefore, they were forgiven the \$10,000.00 premium fee for being on a golf course! Holes 1-18 on Burning Ridge West were complete. That is the portion that is no longer there due to neighboring construction of homes. Lyle and Sally loved the house and the layout and it was reasonably priced. The pool and cabana were here but the Clubhouse didn't come until two years later. A year after that, the maintenance building was constructed. Lyle said the U.S. Air Force Band actually came and played for residents on the deck of our cabana on a 4th of July weekend before the Clubhouse was done.

Lyle said he still firmly believes the MTHOA is on a level above other HOAs in the area. The first HOA meeting had to be held within one year of the first house built. It was held by Glen Hall, the developer, in October of 1984 at a steakhouse in Conway. Lyle was one of the first two residents to be elected as a Director-at-Large. A few years later, Lyle became the Chairman of the Property Committee, which he held for about two years. Lyle and Sally enjoyed the Myrtle Trace plays and other activities at the Clubhouse. Sally was the first instructor for Myrtle Trace Water Aerobics!
