DON'T BE A SILENT VICTIM!

We live in a time where technology has touched and changed our lives in many different ways. While we may enjoy having ready access to information, we have to be aware that others have access to information about us. At last year's safety meeting the police warned us about:

- <u>Phone scams</u> don't answer a phone call if you don't recognize the caller and don't give personal information over the phone unless you know who's asking.
- <u>Electronic scams</u> don't click on a website you're not familiar with (no matter how tempting the offer).
- <u>In-person soliciting</u> don't open your door to anyone you don't know or aren't expecting. And the latest don't accept anything from a stranger who stops you on the street or in your driveway while you're being recorded by their cohort as part of an electronic challenge.

So what can we do to keep our community the safe place we want it to be? We've posted tamperproof signs that can't be stolen; we watch out for one another; and we have Neighborhood Watch patrolling our roads looking for suspicious activity.

But more importantly – what can YOU DO? In every issue of News and Views we try to post the non-emergency police number (843-248-1520) so you can call to report any suspicious activity. The police have invited us to use this number to report incidents so they can be aware of what's going on in our neighborhood and how widespread it is and how often it occurs. They will also increase surveillance in our area. AND IF YOU FEEL THREATENED CALL 911. Once again, this is not complaining or paranoia – it's being a good neighbor and citizen and helping to protect us all.

FEBRUARY 3RD IS A VERY BIG DAY!

MYRTLE TRACE DRIVE REPAVING

The section of Myrtle Trace Drive between the front main entrance and the back gate is owned and maintained by the HOA. The Board signed a contract with Palmetto Paving to mill down and repave the section of road between Berry Tree Lane and Cedar Ridge Lane. This work is to take place February/March of this year.

The existing pavement is beginning to deteriorate with potholes becoming more common especially from the recent heavy rains. In addition to laying down new pavement, the roadway will be a consistent 21 feet wide. Once the pavement is properly cured the contractor will paint stripes along the edges of the roadway and down the center. Reflectors will be placed in the pavement, as well. This should greatly help drivers see the lanes in the road especially at night. Once completed, this section of Myrtle Trace Drive will look like the section of road at the back gate that was repaved last year.

Our goal is to minimize disruption to residents and guests, but since this is the main artery through Phases 1 thru 7, there will be some impact. Weather permitting, the milling and repaving should be complete within 3 days. The contractor will have personnel to direct traffic.

Please be respectful of the workers and exercise patience. Where possible, choose to go in/out of the main entrance or back gate without having to drive through the active work zone. When completed, this project will be an improvement for our community.

We will notify the residents once the contractor provides a firm date for performing the work.

We have often talked about the importance of having an Emergency Contact – someone you would like us to contact should there be an unexpected problem at your residence when you're away or should you experience a medical emergency that you can't handle by yourself. The Emergency Contact form is kept in confidence and you can list family members or friends of your choosing. There will be blank forms available at the annual meeting. This is a service the Association provides and that we hope you take advantage of.

HOMEOWNER'S INSURANCE

Our Covenants require that each homeowner maintain insurance coverage on their home to 100% of replacement cost and that the homeowner provide proof of this insurance to the Association every time the policy is changed or renewed. If you're wondering why – it's because should there be a casualty loss to a property in our community, such as fire, hurricane damage, etc., it is important to the community, as well as the homeowner, to have the damage repaired as quickly as possible and in accordance with Association guidelines. This proof of insurance is particularly important if the owner of the property is an absentee owner or not present in our community at the time of the loss. This insurance information is kept in a confidential file by our Administrative Consultant – Debi Perry. There's a form included with this issue of News & Views with information on how you can easily get that information to her. GOOD NEWS

We've often talked about the County Ditch or the "Big Ditch". The County Ditch carries water runoff from many neighborhoods in our area, including ours, to the waterway and the ocean. It's a very important part of the drainage system for our area. We have spoken with the County on numerous occasions to report clogs, beaver dams and issues impeding the flow of water. We're happy to report that the beaver dams are gone (we're not sure yet about the location of the beavers) and the ditch has been cleaned. So we're in good shape for Spring storms provided the beavers are trapped and don't return, and provided debris is not dumped into the ditch which, unfortunately, happens all too often.

BUDGET REPORT FY 2023

Fiscal year 2023 ended on December 31, 2023. Time seems to fly by.

FY 2023 revenue was 101% of plan while operating expenses were 94% of plan. Accurate budget projections and careful expense management contributed to this positive performance. All major expense categories showed a surplus when compared to budget.

Myrtle Trace reserve funds total \$535,098 and are held in accounts with 4 local banks. The funds are held in checking accounts and certificates of deposit. Reserve fund account balances are reviewed monthly to make sure that we comply with the FDIC regulations for insured deposits. Myrtle Trace's financial position remains strong as we begin a new year.
